

Member State Designations

- Tsunami Warning Focal Points (TWFP) 24/7 receipt and dissemination capabilities (all but one country has designated, 40% correspond to Hydromet Offices)
- National Tsunami Warning Centers (NTWC) responsible for issuing the warning, introduced in 2014 (Oftentimes is also the TWFP) – 50% of MS have made this designation
- **Tsunami National Contact** -responsible for representing MS in ICG meetings and decisions
- Tsunami Advisors
- **IOC Tsunami Unit** (Bernardo Aliaga) is responsible for maintaining this list


















US PTWC (Hawaii) is the CARIBE EWS Tsunami Service Provider

- PTWC has been the TSP for the CARIBE EWS since 2005;
- Began the issuance of the International Enhanced Products as of March 1, 2016. These include text and graphical products;
- As of April 3, 2017 PTWC has taken over from NTWC the responsibility for issuing tsunami warnings for Puerto Rico and Virgin Islands – becoming the sole provider of the NWS tsunami products for the Caribbean.

















Paradigm Shift

Each country, territory or jurisdiction is responsible for:

- establishing alert level (warning, advisory, watch, etc.);
- disseminating the products;

AND;

 issuing the Cancellation and All Clear



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
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Non Seismic Sources of Tsunamis

- Kick'Em Jenny sub-marine volcano had a period of heightened seismic activity and degassing in July 2015;
- Given tsunami concerns, and confusion caused by statements issued by monitoring agencies, the CARIBE EWS established a Task Team to make recommandations on how to deal with such situations;
- Will be discussed in CARIBE EWS XII.

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



Tsunami Ready Recognition Program

- Currently 52 communities in the Caribbean have been recognized TsunamiReady[®]/Tsunami Ready: 46 in Puerto Rico, 3 in the USVI, British Virgin Islands, Anguilla and St. Kitts and Nevis;
- Piloting of the UNESCO IOC Tsunami Ready continues in Grenada and Haiti with funding from USAID/OFDA through CTWP;
- Supported PTWS for UNESCO IOC TR recognition of Cedeño, Honduras;
- Available to share best practices of CARIBE EWS to other ICGS.















Tsunami Ready Guidelines

These guidelines were approved at ICG X in 2015 and further commended by the IOC Executive Council.

Categories

MITIGATION

Mit-1. Have designated and mapped tsunami hazard zones

Mit-2. Have a public display of tsunami information

PREPAREDNESS

Prep-1. Produce easily understood tsunami evacuation maps as determined to be appropriate by local authorities in collaboration with communities

Prep-2. Develop and distribute outreach and public education materials

Prep-3. Hold at least three outreach or educational activities annually

Prep-4: Conduct an annual tsunami community exercise

RESPONSE

Resp-1. Address tsunami hazards in the community's emergency operations plan (EOP)

Resp-2. Commit to supporting the emergency operations center (EOC) during a tsunami incident if an EOC is opened and activated

Resp-3. Have redundant and reliable means for a 24-hour warning point (and EOC if activated) to receive official tsunami threats

Resp-4. Have redundant and reliable means for 24-hour warning point and/or EOC to disseminate official tsunami alerts to the public













TR Preparedness and School Involvement

- Include schools and critical facilities in the emergency operations plan and encourage schools and critical facilities to include tsunamis in their emergency response plans.
- All schools within the community requesting recognition should receive copies of the outreach and public education materials.
- An effort should be made for the schools within the mapped evacuation zone to participate in a tsunami community exercise and by conducting an evacuation drill.

Future Focus of Work

- Strengthened communication between PTWC and the TWFP and NTWC's;
- Country SOP's in sync with enhanced PTWC products;
- Maintenance and Strengthening of the Observation system;
- Tsunami Ready-Evacuation mapping and planning;
- Funding for CTIC;
- Group of Experts to Address other Coastal Hazards (reach out to other partners, like WMO);
- Synergy with Sendai Platform ISDR.













Closing Remarks

- <u>100's of thousands of lives</u> and <u>billions of dollars</u> at risk in the Caribbean and Adjacent Regions from Tsunamis;
- Fortunately the <u>Infrequency of the tsunamis has not</u> <u>disarmed us</u> and CARIBE EWS with its Member States has made very significant advances;
- We are committed to continue developing the best <u>tsunami warning system</u> for the protection of the people and economies;
- Appreciate the engagement of the Member States and support of UNESCO/IOC.
