

# THEMATIC SESSIONS GUIDE

#### 1. General directions

For the Thematic sessions one or more responsible organizations will lead the coordination of the session and define the structure of the session. The Coordinating/Responsible Organizations will present the session's summary matrix (Annex 1) and will appoint the responsible relator for the session.

#### 2. Preparation for the Session

The thematic and parallel sessions could have one or more institutions in charge of the Session organization (See Annex 2). In order to support the coordinating organization, UNISDR will appoint a focal point from UNISDR (Annex 2) to facilitate the contact and support information required. The Coordinating entities will be in charge of:

- a. Provide to UNISDR focal point the name and contact name of the person identified as focal point of the Coordinating organization.
- b. Define / agree the session agenda.
- c. Define the methodology to be used.
- d. Define the suggested panelists and suggested list of organization representatives to be invited. The list must be define jointly with the key partners included in the session matrix (Annex 2 highlighted in green)

#### 3. Goal of the Thematic session

- Take stock of the situation in the region regarding the session thematic area.
- Identify challenges and opportunities in the short and midterm 2012-2015.
- Identify the priority actions to be taken in the Region at regional, sub-regional and national level towards 2015.

#### 4. Thematic session suggested structure

- General presentation of the session subject (Under the session's Coordinating organization).
- Dialogue and thematic discussion according to the methodological approach to be defined by the session's Coordinating institution (panel, round table, working groups, etc.)
- Conclusions and recommendations to be presented in the plenary session.

#### 5. Outcomes:

- The session summary matrix will be handed over by the Coordinating Organization to the focal point to be appointed by UNISDR for this task (Annex 1).
- Conclusions and recommendations presented in power point format to be provided to the groups for the plenary session.







#### 6. Coordinating/Responsible Organization Responsibilities

- Guarantee a geographic and gender balance and a representation of the different panelists and invitees during the session.
- Elaborate the session results in power point format to be provided to the groups for the plenary session.
- Elaborate the session summary matrix (Annex 1) to be handed over to the focal point of UNISDR.
- Likewise the Coordinating organization will be in charge of identifying the panelist to be considered in the session. It is requested to the Coordinating organization provides the list of panelists and the session agenda to UNISDR before July 30 2012 in order to be included in the agenda.
- Likewise, the Coordinating organization will be in charge of the logistic and costs for the attendance to the session of panelists and representatives identified (flight tickets, travel allowances, hotel reservations, etc.)

#### 7. Available logistic support

• UNISDR will provide the computing equipment, projection, equipment, materials, wireless microphones and support staff needed on each session. Any other additional or specific requirement should be requested to the person appointed by UNISDR to support its session.
